# LETTER FROM THE PASTOR PG. 1 OF 2

## **Immigration, Borders, and Human Dignity**

How does a Catholic respond to the new executive orders concerning immigration from the president?

There is so much information and misinformation about immigration in the media that it can be difficult to know what to believe. What is our response and what does our Church say about building a wall along our southern border? It's complicated. All I found was a quote from the Catechism of the Catholic Church that existed long before our current tensions:



Paragraph 2241 of the Catechism states: "The more prosperous nations are obliged, to the extent they are able, to welcome the foreigner in search of the security and the means of livelihood which he cannot find in his country of origin. Public authorities should see to it that the natural right is respected that places a guest under the protection of those who receive him. Political authorities, for the sake of the common good for which they are responsible, may make the exercise of the right to immigrate subject to various juridical conditions, especially with regard to the immigrants' duties toward their country of adoption. Immigrants are obliged to respect with gratitude the material and spiritual heritage of the country that receives them, to obey its laws and to assist in carrying civic burdens."

Notice, this citation doesn't speak of an "open border," which some people propose as a viable option. It is important to note that countries do have the right and duty to set boundaries and secure borders. But there cannot be a closed-door policy either. So yes, there can be a wall, but it should have a gate. Therein lies the debate for many on both sides of the political aisle. In fact, the consensus across the political spectrum seems to be that the manner in which immigrants (both legal and illegal) are processed in our country is at best disorganized, chaotic, and inconsistent and at worst, shameful and unjust. We should be pressuring our legislators to get immigration right and to balance our safety in the process. This is no small or easy task.

We are a blessed country where so many human rights are protected (though not all if we consider things like abortion on demand). It is our duty to use our tremendous influence globally to promote basic human rights inside and outside of our borders. In other words, encouraging/demanding other countries to promote human rights and putting an end to corruption (here and abroad) is an essential building block to create a prosperous country and eliminating the need for immigration in the first place.

But sometimes corruption runs deep. Eliminating such corruption in far off lands is nearly impossible. Look at the complicated political system in Haiti for example. The region's corruption leads to grinding poverty and tremendous suffering. There are few, if any, clear or satisfactory answers.

Some refugees suffering the effects of political violence should feel our support and acceptance whenever possible. Others come here illegally, with the desire to support their families. It is good to remind ourselves again and again as we seek to solve some of our national issues, that from a Catholic perspective, illegal immigrants are human beings with inherent dignity and rights as God's children. As a matter of faith, we must be careful and charitable, most especially when recalling that Our Savior was a political refugee in Egypt at one point in his life.

So, for example, when trying to clarify and enforce immigration laws, justice dictates that people be treated charitably and fairly. Proposals that seek to deport parents, thus separating them from their children, lack charity and justice and assault human dignity. Closer to home, the Diocese of Phoenix offers a variety of assistance to those who are in need of God's love and mercy. However, there have been legal efforts to effectively criminalize providing such emergency assistance to illegal immigrants. Can we as Catholics, in good conscience, obey a law that does not allow us to practice Christian charity to a human being in need of a sandwich and other food, shelter, clothing, or medical care?

Clearly, this is very complicated and there are many competing principles to balance and unfortunately, my column only provides a simple framework for the discussion, not the answers. But all of these principles must be carefully considered and prioritized and legislated. Unfortunately, when one turns on the news today, it seems that a balanced approach that carefully discerns what is God's will and what is best for all, is simply disregarded in favor of more extreme, perhaps flashier positions.

Our elected officials need our prayers, constructive feedback as we work toward policies that seem to elude us, that is, a peaceful sense of the common good. Let us pray for the love and respect of all God's children. Above all, may we seek to love Christ in all those we meet along the way.

## GOSPEL REFLECTION



#### Jesus Opened Their Minds To Understand The Scriptures

Aren't we like the apostles? We won't believe unless we can see with our own eyes. The Gospel accounts attest to the reality of the resurrection of Jesus from the grave. Jesus goes to great lengths to assure his disciples that he is no mere ghost or illusion. He shows them the marks of his crucifixion and he explains how the Scriptures foretold his death and rising.

Jerome (347-420 AD), an early church bible scholar, comments:

"As he showed them real hands and a real side, he really ate with his disciples; really walked with Cleophas; conversed with men with a real tongue; really reclined at supper; with real hands took bread, blessed and broke it, and was offering it to them... Do not put the power of the Lord on the level with the tricks of magicians, so that he may appear to have been what he was not, and may be thought to have eaten without teeth, walked without feet, broken bread without hands, spoken without a tongue, and showed a side which had no ribs." (From a letter to Pammachius against John of Jerusalem 34)

#### The door to heaven and key to paradise is through the cross

The centrality of the Gospel message is the cross - but fortunately it does not stop there. Through the cross, Jesus defeated our enemies - death and Satan and won pardon for our sins. His cross is the door to heaven and the key to paradise. The way to glory is through the cross. When the disciples saw the risen Lord, their disbelief turned to joy! How can death lead to life, the cross to victory? Jesus shows us the way and he gives us the power to overcome sin and despair, and everything else that would stand in the way of his love and truth. Just as the first disciples were commissioned to bring the good news of salvation to all the nations, so, we, too, are called to be witnesses of the resurrection of Jesus to all who live on the face of the earth. Do you witness the joy of the Gospel to those around you?

Lord Jesus, open our minds to understand the Scriptures that we may fully comprehend the truth of your word. Anoint us with your power and give us joy and boldness to proclaim the Gospel in word and deed. www.dailyscripture.net

# Ushers Needed!

The ministry of ushers is the oldest lay ministry in the Catholic Church. The ushers of today have descended from a long line of people of God who have gone before them. During the time of Christ, the doorkeepers of the temple numbered in the hundreds and were the forerunners of today's ushers. It is a ministry of service and connections.

**Ushers are liturgical ministers**. A person's willingness to serve God in the capacity as an usher reflects their commitment to Christ. They must be mindful that they are there to assist those who are preparing to worship God by creating a guiet and reverent atmosphere within the church. Men and women are welcome to apply to be ushers. Ushers assure the comfort of the assembly in the worship space and perform various functions during the liturgy. One of the most important duties that the usher has is that of hospitality. People's impression of a parish is significantly shaped by the presence or absence of a welcoming atmosphere where they come to worship.

Offering a smile and a word of welcome can have a profound impact on people as they arrive.

Ushers provide assistance in emergencies. A couple of years ago, one of our elderly parishioners suffered a stroke during mass. Even before his family could ask for help, our ushers were there with a wheel chair. The paramedics were called and our ushers remained with the family until the parishioner was transported to the hospital.

Being an usher is an important ministry that supports the faith life of the community, conveys the warmth of the Parish, enhances our liturgical celebrations and responds with compassion to the physical needs of the congregation.

**Join this ministry.** Due to recent relocation and normal attrition, the usher ministry is now in need a new volunteers for all masses, especially the 10:00 AM Sunday morning & 5:00 PM Sunday evening. Ushers are scheduled on a rotational basis and according to one's personal schedule. Husbands and wives are encouraged to consider serving together as ushers. Ushers must be at least sixteen years of age.



#### THE COMMUNION RAIL

People often wonder and question why some Catholic churches have and/or use a Communion rail. Fr. Jerry Pokorsky in his article "The Communion Rail and Complementarity" explains the functionality and beauty of the its architectural and theological function.

The traditional Communion rail has functional and sacramental purposes. Restoring the Communion rail to its rightful place in churches has important theological implications. At

Communion time, the people approach the sanctuary to receive. As they kneel, there is a brief time to contemplate the artistry of the altar, the tabernacle, the Crucifix, and the entire sanctuary. They pause, even if only for a few seconds, as the priest efficiently distributes the Hosts. The priest is moving and working hard in his fatherly task. Shoulder to shoulder, the faithful receive from the table of the Lord as a family. There is no rush to depart. All of this reverses the individualistic dynamic of receiving while standing in a Communion line.

When there isn't a Communion rail, the people approach the Communion station and, after receiving Communion, hurriedly depart. A panoramic devotional view of a beautiful sanctuary, like the splendor of decorations adorning a wedding feast, is thus unlikely. The reception of Communion is individualistic, not communal. The priest stands still distributing the Hosts; the people hustle to and fro.

At Communion time, the people approach the sanctuary to receive. As they kneel, there is a brief time to contemplate the artistry of the altar, the tabernacle, the Crucifix, and the entire sanctuary.

The use of a Communion rail allows the faithful to take a moment to reflect more deeply on the Eucharist, to experience in a unique way our relationship to one another and for us to the receive the "body of Christ" at the table of the Lord in a manner that is reserved for this sacramental action.




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
